Reading

As you are already well aware, regular and thorough reading and note-taking are vital ingredients to successful study. At A Level, it is of considerable importance that you read as avidly and widely as possible. Use the school and local library.

Current Events

Finally, and really importantly, get into the habit of reading a newspaper/news website on a regular basis – every day!!

A developing knowledge of current events is <u>essential</u> to success in Politics. We encourage discussion and debate about current issues so make sure you are informed!

Media

As well as reading widely you should consult the editorial/comment section of a 'quality' newspaper as often as possible (preferably daily!) and in addition, keep up-to-date with daily news stories and political analysis. This can be done very effectively through the broadcast media, especially the **BBC News / Politics web pages**

Radio Four, the Today Programme (93.5 FM, 6am – 9am or IPlayer)

- **essential** to listen to part of it every morning, especially the 8am news and usually a significant interview at 8.10am (eg. the P.M. or other important politicians)

Channel Four News (C4, 7:00pm),

Newsnight (BBC2, 10:30pm),

Question Time (BBC1, Thursday 10:30pm) followed by the Week in Politics

Any Questions (Radio Four, Friday 8pm, repeated Saturday / or IPlayer)

Sunday morning politics programmes such as Andrew Marr & regional programmes

So familiarise yourselves with some background information about how the system works and the main players in that system. If you turn up in September and do not know what the House of Lords does or who Theresa May is then we have a problem!
